

ONLINE DANGERS ROADSHOW

Cyberbullying and online child sexual exploitation (OCSE) are serious problems affecting young people every day. Public Safety Canada has created an in-person experience to help raise awareness about these online dangers. The roadshow aims to help youth better empathize with someone who is experiencing cyberbullying and/or OCSE, highlight potential warning signs, and provide the resources they need to stay safer online.



WHAT STUDENTS WILL EXPERIENCE:

- **Overshared** – a touchscreen game that shows what can happen when private pictures are shared, and how to have them removed.
- **Centre of attention** – an immersive experience that allows students to visualize the impacts of cyberbullying from someone else’s perspective.
- **Blurred messages** – an interactive digital simulation of an online conversation with a predator to learn about capping.

WHAT THEY’LL LEARN:

- Definitions of cyberbullying, sexting, sextortion, online grooming and capping.
- How to spot the signs of cyberbullying and OCSE.
- Commonly used tactics of offenders.
- Potential impacts of cyberbullying and OCSE.
- Where they can get help and report an incident.
- How they can safely support someone they know experiencing cyberbullying or OCSE.
- Where to find additional resources.

DETAILS

- 45 minutes to 1-hour sessions depending on school’s schedule and class sizes – up to 30 students per session
- Requires a quiet, spacious (20’ x 20’) location like a gym – ground-level access is preferred
- Must have access to power outlets
- Requires set up (1 hour) and tear down (1 hour), in addition to the duration of the session
- Sessions can be offered in English or French
